Synopsis

A Fall Walleye Index Netting (FWIN) survey was conducted on Three Mile Lake in 2006. A previous FWIN survey was conducted in 2001. Index trap netting was done in 1988. The purpose of this project was to obtain estimates of walleye abundance and population structure in order to describe the current population status and to compare results with previous assessments.

Three Mile Lake supports a viable self-sustaining introduced population of walleye. Abundance is relatively low and is probably limited by the physical characteristics of the lake and the fish community. Periodic recruitment is occurring as evidenced by several year classes observed in the 2001 and 2006 surveys. The structure of the population and fishing quality can be expected to vary as these year classes age. As an introduced population with limited potential, consideration could be given to allow private supplemental stocking with walleye fingerlings, if requested. All stocking should be assessed for effectiveness.
